# HAWKS' SPOT IN RESERVES

Drouin Reserves have thrived on the "underdog" tag during the finals series and no more so than on Sunday when it brushed ROC aside 11-7 to 6-11 in the preliminary final.

It was the first timesin a decade that Drouin had won a reserves' encounter against ROC and opens up a chance to give the club its first premiership in the grade since 1991.

However, the Hawks who have now won three finals games in three weeks - will wear an even bigger underdog label in next Sunday's grand final against Warragul, which has cruised through to the big game of the year without a blemish for the sea-

Drouin conceded height in the ruck and in key positions against ROC, but were disciplined to a team plan and had an army of determined players at ground level.

None were better from the opening bounce until the final siren than the Youngman brothers, Paul and Shane.

Shaun Kleeven and Peter Bartlett superbly performed set tasks in defence that stifled a number of usual scoring avenues for ROC, who got the last two goals of the game to reduce the margin to a level - 26 points that did not reflect Drouin's superiority.

After the first two goals to the Hawks with the breeze, ROC fought back to square the ledger at 2-2 each at quarter time, but Drouin's second quarter when it added three goals to one built the confidence that enabled it to continue on to a good win.

Yet again, captain and ruckman John Ablett conceded height but used his experience to win his

Sean Harvey and Joseph Overdyk also gave their all for the Cobras.



Entry fees for grand final day are \$12 for adults, \$6 for aged pensioners and people 17 years and under are admitted without charge.


No alcohol is allowed to be brought into the venue but

Drouin reserves' upset win over ROC on Sunday may have, in part, been aided by the strength of its coaching panel.

As well as the head reserves' coach, Lloyd Burgmann, the off field bench included senior coach, Mick Fogarty, and assistant senior coach, Darren Sidebottom.

At breaks during the match Burgmann spoke to the defenders as a group, Fogarty the forwards and Sidebottom the centerline and on ball players before Burgmann gave the team addresses.

ROC didn't have the same "luxury" with its senior coaching panel concentrating on its match against Warragul.
